# John LANNING Sarah WHITAKER

**Pioneer John LANNING, Sr.** son of **Joseph LANNING** and **Mary LOWNSBERRY (aka Marcy LOUNSBURY)**, was born on 27 Feb 1757 in Bordentown, Burlington County, NJ and died on 10 Aug 1839 in Fairview, Buncombe County, NC at age 82. He was buried in Cane Creek Cemetery - Fairview, Buncombe County, NC.

**Sarah WHITAKER**, daughter of **Joshua WHITAKER**, **Sr.** and **Mary REED**, was born on 7 Dec 1767 in Swearing Creek, Rowan County, NC. She died on 26 May 1848 in Fairview, Buncombe County, NC at age 80, and was buried in Cane Creek Cemetery - Fairview, Buncombe County, NC.

**John LANNING** married **Sarah WHITAKER** in Oct 1783 in Rowan County, NC. John and Sarah had 14 children, 12 of whom raised families, except two girls. One of them was the mother of an illegitimate son who raised a family.

David Harrison McFalls and Benjamin Franklin McFalls were both sons of George Anderson McFalls and Margaret Lanning. They lived in Henderson County during the early 1920's and both brothers were married to Allison girls who were first cousins to each other. David married Georgia Hester Allison and Ben was married to Jenny Allison. They moved to Henderson County, N.C. from McDowell County, N.C. David's family moved to Polk County, N.C. and many of Benjamin's stayed in Henderson. They lived in the Hooper's Creek area of the County.

Margaret Lanning's family was in the Hooper's Creek section of Henderson County and the adjoining Cane Creek section of Buncombe County. Her father, Francis Govan Lanning was the son of William Lanning who was son of Enos Lanning whose father was John Lanning (Revolutionary War Soldier) who has a stone marker with his regiment info on it in Cane Creek Cemetery in Buncombe County, N.C. John Lanning was married to Sarah Whitaker.

Sarah WHITAKER was born 7 DEC 1768 in Rowan County, North Carolina, and died 26 MAY 1848 in Fairview, North Carolina. She was buried in Cane Creek, Cemetery, in Buncombe County, North Carolina. She was the daughter of Joshua WHITAKER and Mary Reed. She married John LANNING OCT 1783.

# Excerpt from: The Fairview Town Crier/ Days gone by...in Fairview by Bruce Whitaker August 1999 John Lanning

John Lanning, Sr., was an early settler of Fairview. He was born February 27, 1757, near Bordentown, Burlington County, New Jersey. John was the son of Joseph and Mary Lounsberry Lanning. He moved with his parents to Rowan (now Davidson) County, North Carolina, as a young boy.

At the age of 19, Lanning entered the service of the North Carolina Militia as a substitute for his father. He served off and on during the following three years. While serving under General Rutherford, Lanning took part in an expedition against the Cherokee Indians. Lanning said he was at the burning of the valley towns. Later, in 1779, he marched from Rowan County across South Carolina to the Savannah River, crossing it a mile below Augusta, Georgia. He then recrossed the river and marched towards Charleston, South Carolina, where his unit joined General Butler at the Ashley River. Lanning fought in the Battle of Stono just outside Charleston.

After returning home to Rowan County, John Lanning courted Sarah Whitaker. Sarah was the daughter of Joshua Whitaker, Sr. (1735-1798) and Mary Reed (1748-1832). Sarah was born on her father's farm on Swearing Creek, near Linwood, in Rowan (now Davidson) County in 1768. John and Sarah married in October 1783, and then lived in Rowan County until the mid - 1790's, when they followed the Whitakers, Reeds, and other neighboring families in moving to Fairview. The Lannings settled on Gap Creek near where it runs into Cane Creek. John acquired over 800 acres of land in his south Fairview farm. John and Sarah later acquired a second farm on Hooper's Creek in what is now Henderson County. Lanning bought 298 acres there from Russell Twitty in 1805. He added to his Hooper's Creek farm until it grew to 419 acres. The Lannings would spend two or three seasons at the

Fairview farm and then move to the Hooper's Creek farm for a couple of years before moving back to Fairview. This appears to have been an early attempt at soil conservation. John Lanning would farm the soil for two or three years and then move to his other farm and let the soil lie fallow to build it up before moving back and plowing it again.

John and Sarah Whitaker Lanning were Baptists and good friends of the Reverend Thomas Stradley, the best-known area preacher of his time. Reverend Stradley testified for John Lanning in regard to his war service, when John applied for a Revolutionary War pension in 1832. Lanning's sister Achsah (Aeshia) Lanning Reed also testified for him, as well as Hannah Trantham, Eldad Reed (his brother-in-law), John Reed (nephew), Richard Sumner, Thomas T. Patton, and his mother-in-law Mary Reed Whitaker. Lanning was granted a pension retroactive to March 1831. He received \$31.33 annually for the rest of his life. John Lanning, Sr. died at his farm in Fairview on August 10, 1839. Sarah Whitaker Lanning applied for a Revolutionary War Widow's pension four years later. The pension was granted and she received it until her death on May 26, 1848. John Lanning, Sr. and his wife Sarah were buried in Cane Creek Cemetery in Fairview.

#### [Source] --

John Lanning and wife Sarah Whitaker moved to Buncombe Co., NC, along with Achash Lanning Reed, his sister.

John was a farmer and gristmill operator - owner in the Cane Creek area. There are supposedly remnants of the Lanning Mill still around on Lanning Mill Road. John and his sons owned more than one mill in the Buncombe and Henderson County area.

John owned slaves during his lifetime and some were left to his wife and children after his death according to his will.

#### Noted Events In The Life Of John And Sarah

1774 – 1784 – American Revolutionary War raged in America and John was a part of it. [See General Notes]

1783 – John and Sarah were married in Rowan County during the war.

# 1790 – Rowan County, NC

**Mid 1790s** – John moved his family from Rowan County to Buncombe County and became one of the pioneer settlers in the mountains.

Pioneer John appears to have moved from Rowan County to Buncombe County between 1794 and 1795. Child John was born in Rowan County in 1794 and the next child Nancy was born in Buncombe County in 1795.

**1839 – August 10** – John Lanning gives over to death and is laid to rest in the Cane Creek Cemetery (part of Cane Creek Baptist Church at that time).

James and Mary lived in Hooper's Creek valley. Hooper's Creek in Henderson County, North Carolina is a stream, a road, and a place. It is a township along the northern edge of the county; and it is a community that was known from the early days of Buncombe County. Henderson County was formed out of Buncombe County in 1838, but Hooper's Creek remained in Buncombe until legislative action in 1851. That can cause confusion for the researcher when all of those families found in Henderson County in 1860 are absent in 1850, only to be found in Buncombe County. Why did they all move? The question looms until it is learned that the only thing that moved was a line from one ridge top to another. That's one of the curve balls that genealogical research can throw at you.

James Lanning, the eleventh child and the seventh son of Pioneer John Lanning, was born on Monday, December 23, 1804, on the Clear Creek farm of his father in Henderson County, North Carolina. His father owned two farms, one on Cane Creek near the present village of Fairview in Buncombe County, and the other in Henderson County. The family tradition is that he moved from one to the other as his fancy prompted him. James married Polly Vaughn. The records of the marriage have not been preserved. Their oldest child, Minerva, was born January 14, 1827, so the marriage took place some time in 1826. They were married in a house that stood near the north end of the railway cut running through the old MacCase farm near Skyland. The name of the officiating minister or Justice is unknown. Polly Vaughn was the daughter of Leroy Vaughn and was born June 12, 1807. She became the mother of 11 children.

James Lanning first lived, after his marriage, on rented land on Cane Creek at the foot of Burnie's mountain. He soon purchased a farm of 80 acres on Lime Stone Creek from Dr. Phillips. There he built a home and raised his family.

Only 5 of his children raised families. Their births, marriages, and deaths are found in the foregoing lineage charts. Minerva married her distant kinsman, Jesse Whitaker who died after approximately thirteen years of marriage, leaving his widow with 7 children, 5 of whom reached maturity. She died in 1902 after more than 43 years of widowhood.

Harvey Lanning married Sarah Ann Whitaker, a sister of Jesse Whitaker. Harvey died at the age of 26 after a married life of little more than 4 years. He left 3 children, and his widow died in 1902 after a widowhood of more than 51 years.

Alcy, Mary and Newton were three of the younger children, who married and raised families.

Harvey Lanning and Jesse Whitaker both died of typhoid fever.

Jasper Lanning also died of typhoid at the early age of 20. He died in time of the Civil War and had only one visit from a physician, Dr. Allen from Hendersonville. His bill was \$30, and this bill was always remembered in the family as exorbitant.

Martha Lanning's clothing caught fire and burned her to death when she was not quite 3 years old.

Amanda and Elizabeth Lanning died within 6 days of each other of scarlet fever, at the approximate ages of 7 and 9 years.

Gardner Lanning reached maturity and died of "Galloping Consumption" contracted when a soldier in the Confederate Army. The details are given in his war record.

Alcy Lanning died at the age of 72 of hardening of the arteries. Between the births of Jasper and Mary Lanning, there was the birth of a stillborn son.

Mary married, raised a family and died from the after effects of pneumonia.

Newton Lanning suffered a long time from asthma, which was the indirect cause of his death coupled with infirmities of age.

Minerva Lanning suffered nearly all her life from a weak stomach and this trouble coupled with the infirmities of age caused her death at the age of 76.

James Lanning suffered two strokes of paralysis and was helpless in his last days, but he died of inflammation of the bladder.

Polly Vaughn died of dropsy. She suffered much in her life from rheumatism. Both of these physical troubles showed weak kidneys.

This phase of the family history is gone into in detail that it may show the descendants of this couple the inherited tendencies to certain diseases that ran in this family. Dr. Fletcher's method of treating typhoid was turpentine. Turpentine is no doubt a good antiseptic and would destroy typhoid germs, but it must have been very severe on the thin tissue of the bowels. James Lanning had typhoid and ever afterwards suffered with his kidneys, always claimed it was caused from taking so much turpentine when he had typhoid. Then, the method of nursing typhoid patients and keeping them perfectly still on their back was unknown. A typhoid patient moving around is extremely dangerous. Then, the patients were not allowed to have fresh air. All doors and windows were kept closed. The treatment of preventive inoculations were unknown in that day.

James Lanning was a mechanical genius. He had his own blacksmith shop, carpenter shop, and shoe shop. He tanned the leather and made the shoes for his whole family. He also owned his own distillery. He once build an old-fashioned wooden wagon that lasted on the farm for many years. It is said he employed someone to help him iron it and this is the only time he ever employed an outside mechanic to help him in any of his mechanical work necessary on his farm. He showed his superior intelligence by cutting a ditch straight through his farm and confining the creek to its channels. No oxbows washed away his farm as many of the farmers along small streams allow to this day. This was a unique feature of his farm in contrast with the negligence of other farmers of his day. He built his own house of logs. It consisted of two large separate rooms with the same chimney separating and serving for both. Each was two stories high and the stairway led from a long porch the entire length of both up through the division made by the chimney. The porch was also two stories high. A cellar was dug under the kitchen. It was a very substantial building, and would be a great curiosity to the younger members of his descendants today.


While he had many deaths in his family, he was not bothered with the exorbitant charges of the present day undertakers. He kept a quantity of fine Poplar planks in the loft of one of the outhouses. When a death occurred, he made a coffin for the body. Funerals of that day were not so artistically conducted as they are today, but the pioneers were not robbed in burying their dead. Many specimens of his mechanical skills are scattered among his descendants. One of them is a large cupboard made of heavy Walnut planks of a very fine quality. Another is a work basket that certainly required a high degree of ingenuity and skill. Work baskets then were not ornaments for a center table.

His son, Jasper, seemingly inherited all of his father's mechanical skill. W.R. West, a relative who knew him from his earliest boyhood, once said: "Had Jasper Lanning lived, he would have been one of the finest workmen this county every produced." One of the samples of his mechanical skill young Jasper left was a homemade violin--a creditable musical instrument. All who knew him pronounced him a bright man. He taught school in the very early pioneer days. his scholastic qualifications for a teacher must have been very meager. He was able to meet the simple requirements of his day. The length of the term and the attendance are unknown. He received a monthly salary of \$8. Dollars were worth much more then than now. He was industrious and honest to the core. Honesty and integrity were characteristics of the Lanning clan in the old days. His chief defect of character was that he imbibed too freely of alcoholic liquors. He drank to excess. His father before him was a distiller.

James Lanning never connected himself with any church. In his old days he was a great Bible reader. Polly, his wife, was a Methodist, and all who knew her pronounced her one of the best of women. She was very kind to the orphan children of her family. She went through many sad bereavements in her life. All of the members of the James Lanning family are buried in old Cane Creek cemetery, except Newton. He and his wife are buried at Tweed's Chapel. All of Newton's children are yet living.

The stones of Sarah Ann, wife of Harvey Lanning, are not very distinct.

# "Barnwell Family of Western North Carolina"

The Barnwell family of Western North Carolina migrated from Ireland, where they had been living for about five hundred years. The first immigrants to Ireland were actually Norman, so ultimately we are actually apparently French, by way of England, Ireland, Pennsylvania and finally western North Carolina.

Perhaps the most surprising fact is that when the Barnwells immigrated, they did not use the name Barnwell. When they immigrated, they used the name Barnhill. This is not really as odd as it sounds. The names Barnwell and Barnhill are two branches of the same family in Ireland. Also, names just changed a lot in the 19th century. The Garrens were original Garns and the Lannings were originally Llanyons. In any case, the records I found confused me quite a lot until I found out about the name change. For some as yet unexplained reason, the entire family changed its name from Barnhill to Barnwell sometime between 1850 and 1860. Perhaps it had to do with the political atmosphere leading up to the Civil War in 1861. During the 1850's, there was continuous quarreling between the Northern and Southern states. The Barnhills having migrated from Pennsylvania may have been known as the Barnhills from Pennsylvania. Preferring to fit in with their southern neighbors a name change to Barnwell, well known in South Carolina, would leave little doubt as to their belonging to the south.

#### **IRELAND AND BEFORE:**

William Barnhill was our immigrant ancestor. William Barnhill came to America with his family sometime after 1800, probably around 1805. He did not come immediately to North Carolina, but settled first in Pennsylvania. William Barnhill was part of a general immigration from the north of England, the south of Scotland and the north of Ireland to America. This immigration started about 1760 and, after a pause for the Revolution, ended in the mid 1830's. This is often called the Scotch-Irish immigration. This immigration was, culturally, mostly Celtic in nature, and many of the immigrants ended up in Appalachia. This was really the fourth, and last, immigration of English speaking people from the British Islands to America. The other three were the Puritans from East Angelica (in England) to New England, the Cavaliers from west England to the southern tidewater (the coastal plains from Virginia to Savannah, Georgia), and the Quakers from the English midlands to Pennsylvania. All three of these earlier waves of immigrants were well settled by the time the Scotch-Irish immigration began.

The Scotch-Irish immigration route usually started in a New England or Virginian port. From there the immigrants, who were mostly not welcome along the coast, drifted west, then south through the valleys of western Virginia to western North Carolina, eastern Tennessee, West Virginia and eastern Kentucky. **William Barnhill** came over this route by way of McDowell County over Middle

Fork Mountain to Cane Creek, to Bear Wallow and Clear Creek. <u>In 1814</u> he purchased a tract of land from <u>John Lanning</u> in what was then Buncombe County. The family homestead overlooks the valley of Hooper's Creek, and the farm was said to be "stately" and "prosperous."

At this time, I do not know the exact makeup of <u>William Barnhill's</u> family at the time of the immigration. I do know that William Barnhill's daughter, <u>Margaret (1784?)</u>, married <u>Enos Lanning</u> from the pioneer Lanning family. I also know that in 1820, the census [Buncombe County, NC] shows the William Barnhill Family with one male under ten, one male over forty-five and one female over forty-five. He is living next to his son, James Barnhill.

In deeds transferring land on Grant Mountain Road, a cemetery is excepted from the land transfers.

There are about 27 graves in the Barnwell Cemetery, which is located on the property of George Barnwell and family.

"The cemetery is in excellent condition," Miller said.

Almost all the headstones identify the person buried there. Three fieldstones were found and a hand-carved marker, which could not be read. On the back of the stone is carved "Done by John Jack." There have also been recent burials in the cemetery.

The earliest burial appears to be that of <u>Enos Barnwell</u>, born in the 1790s. He was the son of the first Barnwell in what is now Henderson County, <u>William Barnhill</u>. The name was later changed to Barnwell, according to genealogists.

William Barnhill moved from Pennsylvania to North Carolina and purchased land in 1814 from John Lanning on Hoopers Creek. Several of his descendants are buried in the cemetery.

Surnames found in the cemetery are Laughter, Owenby, Nix, Connor, Dimsdale and Thomas.

The cemetery is on the county's GIS.



1814 - William purchased property in Buncombe County, NC.

William purchased a tract of land from John Lanning in what was then Buncombe County. The family homestead overlooks the valley of Hooper's Creek, and the farm was said to be "stately" and "prosperous."

Hooper's Creek in Henderson County, North Carolina is a stream, a road, and a place. It is a township along the northern edge of the county; and it is a community that was known from the early days of Buncombe County. Henderson County was formed out of Buncombe County in 1838, but Hooper's Creek remained in Buncombe until legislative action in 1851. That can cause confusion for the researcher when all of those families found in Henderson

County in 1860 are absent in 1850, only to be found in Buncombe County. Why did they all move? The question looms until it is learned that the only thing that moved was a line from one ridge top to another. That's one of the curve balls that genealogical research can throw at you.

**1820** -- He appeared on the Federal census in 1820 in Buncombe County, NC.

# **General Notes And Events For William and Sarah RACKLEY**

- 1. South Carolina was part of the Province of "Carolina" until 1710 when North and South Carolina were made separate provinces. In the early years of South Carolina (1682-1769) Counties were only used for geographical divisions, and did not have governmental functions. In 1706 Parishes were set up and coexisted within the various counties. These Parishes remained until after 1790. In 1769 South Carolina was divided into seven Judicial Districts, which served as the Governmental units. Later these districts were subdivided into counties, which rarely served any official function. Many of these counties later became districts and took on governmental duties. It was not until 1868 that South Carolina re-designated all of the Districts as "Counties".
- 2. In 1682 three Proprietary counties were set up: Berkeley, Colleton and Craven. In 1685 Carteret County was added. Carteret was renamed Granville County in 1708. These four counties remained until 1769 when they were abolished in favor of the new Judicial Districts.
- 4. In 1769 Seven Judicial Districts were created that abolished the four existing old counties. The Districts coexisted with the various Parishes. In 1785 the Districts were divided into counties, many of which never became functional. At various times, many of the counties became Districts and in some cases abolished their old Districts in the process. In some cases the counties themselves were abolished in favor of the parent District.
- 10. Ninety-six District was created in 1769. In 1785 Ninety-Six District was divided into six counties: Abbeville, Edgefield, Laurens, Newberry, Spartanburg and Union. In 1786 Greenville County was created. In 1789 Pendleton County was created. In 1791 Pinckney District was formed from parts of Ninety-six and Camden Districts, taking the counties of Spartanburg and Union. Also in 1791 Washington District was formed from Ninety-six District taking the counties of Greenville and Pendleton. In 1798 Ninety-six was abolished when all of its counties became Districts: Abbeville, Edgefield, Laurens and Newberry.

Almost all the Rackley men farmed prior to the Civil War, though many practiced a trade on the side. John III was a carpenter, and his son, Passon, a saddle maker. After the Civil War, many Rackley men turned to the mercantile business, the railroads, the ministry, medicine and education, but the majority remained farmers or builders.

William Rackley, (eldest son of Mills Rackley) and his wife had eight children (4 boys and 4 girls).

The Vanderfords arrived in North Carolina in the mid 1700s. In 1761 Michael Vanderford purchased 620 acres in Granville County and in 1767 Noah Vanderford purchased 100 acres in Bertie County. William Vanderford (246) was settled in Anson County prior to the recording of land records. The *1770s* saw John Vanderford (1014), Hollingsworth Vandever (236), *Charles Vandever* (244) and James Vanderford (240) all leaving the Maryland/Delaware area to settle in North Carolina.

The journey from the eastern shore must have been arduous. The road was little more than a trail. But in the Carolinas there was plenty of land and the price was right. The Vanderfords settled where the land was fertile and the game most abundant.

Towns took a long time to develop. For years they were composed only of public buildings, a store or two, a blacksmith shop and a few inns furnishing "entertainment for man or beast."
